Reading the group's Guide to Summer I turned Pretty trilogy by Jenny Han ABOUT BOOKS For belly, summer time means all her favorite things: swimming, the beach, and Fisher boys, Conrad and Jeremiah. She spent the summer with the Fisher family in Cousins Beach for as long as she remembers. Belly has always been in love with Conrad, and finally one fateful summer, it seems that he may have feelings for her too. But it turns out that also Jeremiah. Soon the belly realizes that she will have to choose between two brothers who love her, and in doing so, will have to break one of their hearts. Amid growing up, changing family dynamics, laughter and loss comes a poignant and relatable trilogy about a girl learning what it means to love. Summer I turned pretty Jenny Han Discussion Issues 1. Summer I turned pretty starts with a short scene before the first chapter. How did you interpret that? Why do you think Jenny Hahn presents the book this way? 2. We get a great feeling for a home in Cousins Beach in the first chapter. How does Jenny Hahn use all five senses to describe the setting of the novel? Describe similar examples of writing crafts throughout the book. 3. What does it mean quite in regards to the title of the book? How would Belly define pretty? How do you define quite? Is there a difference between beautiful and beautiful? Consider these references: She shook her head as she was in awe of me. You're so beautiful, so beautiful. You're going to have an amazing, amazing summer. It will be a summer you will never forget. It was summer when I became beautiful. It was Cam, the real guy who noticed me before I was beautiful. No. Cam ran his hand through his hair. He didn't want to look at me. That's because I thought you were really beautiful. Probably the most beautiful girl I've ever seen. Cam looked puzzled. Why? Your nose is cute. It's the flaws that make things beautiful. He was the first boy to tell me I was beautiful. 4. Summer I turned quite said in the first person from the belly perspective, apparently in retrospect. When now, from which she tells? How did you know? How could there be another story if Jenny Hahn had written a third-person novel? 5. Chapters alternate between past and present, between significant memories of earlier years and current experiences. What purpose do these memories serve? 6. How does everyone in the house (Jeremiah, Conrad, Suzanne, and Laurel) play a role in history, in general, and in the life of the belly? How does the dynamic change when Steven leaves? How could there be a different atmosphere if Mr. Fisher had visited, or even Stephen's belly and father? 7. I'm getting old, too. Things can't stay the same forever. What do you think Jenny Hahn is proposing here? Remember the time in your life you realized that you were growing up, and how it felt. 8. Belly and boys love to play you would rather. Borrowing the example of Jeremiah: Would you rather live one perfect day over and over again or live your life without perfect days, but only worthy? What do you think? How do these competing scenarios relate to facial abdominal problems? If you ask again at the very end of the summer, do you think the belly will stick to her original answer (just for decent days)? 9. What is the turning point in the relationship between the belly and Conrad? Were you surprised by the direction it took? 10. When did you start thinking that there might be something seriously wrong with Suzanne, and/or the family situation? What were the signs? 11. Explain the belly feelings to Cam over the course of the novel. Does she ever like him? What prevented her from eventually falling in love with him? Consider these examples of belly observations about Cam: But there was something about it that seemed safe and comfortable. He'd probably meet some random homeless guy and become best friends with him and then he'd tell me the story of a man's life the next day. Not that there were any homeless guys on our beach end. Not that I've ever seen a homeless man in Cousins, for that matter. But if that were the case, Cam would have found it. I ran to the front door, and I didn't have to turn around to know that Cam was going to wait until I was inside before he left. Here I had a really great guy who really loved me. 12. What's the point of including a childhood belly friend, Taylor, in the summer I turned Pretty? How does Jenny Hahn use Taylor to help the reader get to know the belly better? 13. Old pull, tide draws me back in. I kept getting caught in this current-first love, I mean. My first love kept making me go back to it, to him. It's still breathtaking just being by his side. I lied to myself the night before, thinking I was free, thinking I had let him go. No matter what he said or did, I would never let him go. Do you identify with Jenny Han's powerful description of first love? Discuss the difference between crush and love. How can the belly differentiate the two? 14. Suzanne jokes about her cancer. What was the impact of this comedic moment on the characters of the novel? How has this affected you as a reader? 15. Which of Belly's three love interests in The Summer I Turned Pretty do you like most - Conrad, Jeremiah or Cam? Compare and compare and then come up with a list of qualities for the perfect summer novel! Discuss the end. What happened? What do you think will happen from here? It's not summer without you opening on a sad note. We learn that Belly and Conrad are not together, and that Suzanne has passed away. How did this beginning affect you? How did Jenny Hahn continue the belly story of the summer I turned pretty, and how she introduced a whole new in the sequel? 2. We see a lot more of Taylor in This Is Not Summer without you. How would you describe Belly's friendship with Taylor? What role does Taylor play in Belly's life? Where

do you see their friendship going from here- do you imagine their staying friends like Laurel and Suzanne or have they already outgrown each other? Consider these references: But for better or for worse, Taylor Jewel was a part of me and I was part of it. I knew what Taylor meant well. She thought she was doing me a favor. Giving up her platform sandals for the night was altruistic, for Taylor. But I was still crazy. Taylor was a shitty friend, not me. I was so angry, my hand was shaking when I put on eyeliner and I had to erase it and start over. I wore Taylor's blouse and her shoes and I pulled my hair all to one side too. I did it because I knew it would hurt her. But the things she said, they hurt. Maybe they were true. But I don't know if I can forgive her for what they say. 3. Unlike the summer I turned quite, we are presented in terms of other than just belly-a few chapters written from Jeremiah's perspective. How does this change your experience as a reader? Do you look at the characters or situations differently when you hear Jeremiah's side? Why do you think Jenny Hahn decided to show us Jeremiah's point of view, not Conrad's?4. How is the belly experience in the summer I turned pretty and in this not summer without you represent her coming of age? Is the belly a child or an adult? Can it be both at the same time? At what point does she grow up? What factors accelerated or delayed her entry into adulthood? Consider these references: The only person I wanted was Suzanne. She was the only one. And then I had an idea as clear as day. I'd never be anyone's favorite again. I will never be a child again, not in the same way. Now it's over. She's really gone. So I took a beer and went back outside with him. I sat down on a sun lounger and popped out from the top of the can. He snapped satisfactorily. It was strange to be alone in this house. Not a bad feeling, just different. I've been going to this house all my life and I could count on one hand how many times I'd be alone in it. What I suppose I was, but I guess I don't remember feeling old last summer. I was waiting for him to call me a baby for calling my mom the second thing got scared. He didn't. Instead, he said, thank you. I was looking at him. Sometimes you surprise me,' I said. You're still the same. My mother and Mr. Fisher drank coffee the way adults do. Do you want an old lady like me around? She asked. Of course I'll be back when you have me. He asked. He looked so young, so vulnerable my heart ached a little bit. 5. When the belly sees an infinity necklace in Conrada, she takes the takes puts it on. Why would she do that? Would you take the necklace if you were Belly? What do you think of Belly for that?6. While the summer, which I have turned quite, took place exclusively in Cousins, the events of It's Not Summer Without You take place in several different conditions; Cousins, Belly House, Jeremiah and Conrad's House, and Conrad College. Also, the house in Cousins has a very different feel this summer than it did for the characters in the past. How important is the environment in fiction? How important is setting up this story?7. How did your opinion about the belly develop after reading this sequel? How do you understand it better? How disappointed, supportive, surprised or embarrassed by her actions in the sequel compared to the Summer I turned Pretty?8. How has Belly's relationship with her mother changed or remained the same in Not Summer Without You? What do you think and feel about Laurel as a mother belly, but also as a character in her own right? Consider these references: I wanted to yell at her to tell her how insensitive, how cruel she was, and she couldn't see my heart literally breaking? But when I looked at her face, I bit off the words and swallowed them. She was right. It wasn't like that, and most of all me. Suddenly I just wanted my mother. Her words stung me so much that I wanted to hurt her back a million times worse. So I said what I knew would hurt her the most. I said, I wish Suzanne was my mother, not you. I looked at Conrad and he said in a low voice to no one in particular, 'Laurel is amazing. I've never heard anyone describe my mom that way, especially not Conrad. I never thought of her as amazing. But at that moment it was. She really was. 9. Belly recognizes her unrequited love for Conrad: It wasn't like it was with Conrad and Aubrey. He loved her. Once upon a time, he was crazy about her. He's never been like this to me. Nver. But I loved him. I've loved it longer and truer than anyone in my life, and I've probably never loved anyone that way again. Which, frankly, was almost a relief. What does That Mean? Do you believe her? 10. The kiss of the belly and Jeremiah was passionate, intense and extremely meaningful to both of them. Describe the time when you felt the ground stop turning. 11. Belly returns the necklace of infinity, which she took from Conrad's table. What does this moment mean for the belly? Conrad? Discuss the symbolism of the necklace.12 Who are you in the title of the book? 13. As the summer I turned Pretty, this next book in the series ends with a mysterious preview of what's to come. A couple of years later gives us a snapshot of the wedding day belly. Who do you think she's going to marry? Why does Jenny Hahn conclude a novel this way? We will always have Summer Jenny HanDiscussion Issues 1. We can tell a lot about a person She's holding. In We'll Always Have Summer, we met Belli's friendship with Anika, in addition to her constant friendship with Taylor. How do friendships look like? How are they different? What roles do Taylor and Anika play, respectively, in The Life of Belly, at a time when the novel is happening?2. When Bally tells Arika about Jeremiah's infidelity, Anika replies, Keeping such a secret from the person you love is probably the worst part. We learn about a few secrets in We'll Always Have Summer- Jeremiah's, Belly's, Conrad's. How much of what happens in this third novel depends on the secrets? Is it possible to keep secrets? Is it ever normal to keep secrets from people you love in particular? 3. We'll Always Have Summer is the most nostalgic of the three books in the Jenny Hahn series. The name evokes warmth and comforting permanence of memories. Belly is particularly touched by her memories of growing up on Cousins Beach, especially as she presents images that she recalls of Jeremiah and Conrad. Discuss Belly's reaction to her realization that she had a story of Rosie, a dog, all wrong in her memory: What else did I remember wrong? I was a man who loved to play Remember when in my head. I've always been proud of the way I remembered every detail. It scared me to think that my memories might just be so a little wrong. How much love is Belly for Jeremiah and Conrad based on memories? How much weight can we appropriate as a basis for a current relationship? What value does The Belly put on her memories? 4. Conflicting feelings of the belly to Jeremiah and Conrad come to mind in We'll Always Have Summer. As the stomach struggles with determining how she feels, she simultaneously struggles to control her feelings. Is it even possible for people to control love? Discuss what the following quote means to you, and to what extent you agree that feelings can be safely hidden. · I thought my feelings for Conrad were safely hidden, like my old Rollerblades and little gold watch my father bought me when I first learned how to tell the time. 5. Describe your first love. How did this first experience shape who you are today? Discuss the meaning of first love, compared to last love, as touchingly formulated belly: Maybe it was as it was with all the first loves. They own a little piece of your heart, always. Conrad at twelve, thirteen, fourteen, fifteen, sixteen, even seventeen. For the rest of my life, I thought of him fondly, about making your first pet, about the first car you drove. The first ones were important. But I was sure that the latter were even more important. And Jeremiah, it will be my last, and all mine always. 6. Taylor insists: You have to have everything you want, belly . . . You only get married once. Describe your perfect wedding, would you rather have, but could do without when the push comes to poke? What are the features of your dream wedding switches - what do you think is absolutely necessary?7. One of the hardest parts about going to college, or moving, or just starting a new school, for that matter, is getting back. The belly is extremely relieved to be invited to his roommate's room to hang out with the girls. She admits: Maybe it was my people. Who are your people? What qualities do you look for in new friends? What advice would you share with Belly in order to make friends in the first semester of college?8. Belly feelings for Conrad are deeply conflicted throughout the three books in the Jenny Hahn series. As for whether Conrad will attend the wedding of Belly and Jeremiah, Belly admits: I think I was afraid. Afraid he would come, and feared he wasn't. What does she mean by that?9. Finally, hearing Belly's point of view, and then the beginning of Jeremiah, in This Is Not Summer without you we have a window in Conrad's mind. How did your impression of Conrad change at that moment? Why did Jenny Hahn decide not to show Conrad's point of view so far? Why show changing points of view (except belly) in the first place - what effect does it have on how you interpret history?10. We see that Belly's relationship with her mother develops throughout the three-book series. In We'll Always Have Summer, we are implicated in the irresistible power dynamic between mother and daughter, which has not been so obvious in the past. What is this power dynamics, and what do you attribute it to? How would you describe the nature of Belly and Laurel's relationship? Consider the following examples: And she was bluffing. She should have been bluffing. No matter how upset or disappointed she was in me, I couldn't believe she would miss her only daughter's wedding. I just couldn't. Alone in my car again, I cried loudly, dangling sobs. I cried until my throat hurt. I was angry at my mom, but more than it was this overwhelming, heavy sadness. I grew up to do something myself, without it. I can get married, I can quit my job. I was a big girl. I didn't have to ask for permission. My mother was no longer all powerful. Part of me wanted her to be. 11. How important is it to you that your family accepts your significant other and the choices you make with it? Also, how important is it for you to have the blessings of your friends?12. While she tries to convince herself otherwise, her stomach is wrought with guilt after her subtle but dramatic encounter with Conrad: first with peaches and then when she nurses his surfing wounds. Is Belly's guilt justified? Why do you think these moments matter to the stomach?13 Conrad asks his former employer and dear friend, Ernie: Do you really believe that? What should people be with one person? How would you answer that question? Do you believe in soul mates, or can you love more than one person throughout your life? Is it possible to love more than one person in It's time? Bruho considers this possibility when she realizes that she has a sense of love for Jeremiah and Conrad. How would you explain it?14. Jenny Khan gives us many opportunities to compare and contrast Jeremiah and Conrad as who they are as individuals and also who they are, how they relate to their belly. Belly constantly evaluates two brothers. Several times in We'll Always Have Summer, she even confuses the two, like when she realizes it was Conrad who found the dog, Rosie, not Jeremiah. A similar confusion occurs at the very end of the book when Jeremiah opens her letter from Suzanne, only to realize that the letter inside was really for Conrad: My mom must have mixed up the envelopes. In the letter, she said she had only seen him in love once. It was with you. Can you recall other similar confusions? What do we learn from these confusions? 15. Explain the title of this third book in the series, we will always have a summer. What does this mean for you? Who do we refer to? How would you define summer in this context?16. Finally, after three wonderfully tense and poignant romances, we learn which belly brother ends. Do you think Belly made the right choice? Were you surprised by her choice? Are you satisfied with this end of the series? Discussion Issues for Trilogy1. On the last page We will always have a summer, we will find out which belly brother chooses to spend his life with. What clues do you see in retrospect that pointed to this end result? 2. Discuss the titles of three books in the Jenny Hahn series. Who am I referring to, you and us will be respective? What does summer symbolize belly? For you?3. Which character has changed the most in three books? Which character surprised you the most? Which character are you most closely related to?4. Behold the belly experience from when we meet her in the summer I turned quite through the final book in the series. How would you describe her journey as a whole? Faced with tough choices, did she always do the right thing? What were her biggest mistakes? Her biggest successes?5. What elements of writing craft do you think Jenny Hahn demonstrated particularly well? How would you describe her letter?6. What impact has this story had on you as a reader over the course of three books? Would the story be different if it was compressed into one, comprehensive novel?7.
